The California Student Opportunity and Access Program (Cal-SOAP) was established by the state Legislature in 1978 to improve the flow of information about postsecondary education and financial aid and to raise the achievement levels of students (both low-income and ethnic groups) who are historically underrepresented in postsecondary education.

Today, Cal-SOAP projects operate in eight locations throughout the state by consortia of secondary and postsecondary schools and community agencies. Cal-SOAP works in cooperation with other intersegmental outreach programs to avoid service duplication. In many instances, Cal-SOAP fulfills needs not met by other programs. In 1995-96, five active Cal-SOAP projects provided outreach services to more than 29,000 students. The projects propose to serve about 28,000 secondary (grades 4 - 12) and, in some cases, community college students and their parents during 1996-97.

Cal-SOAP projects include: East Bay (Oakland and Richmond), San Diego, Santa Barbara, South Coast (Whittier), and SUCCESS (Solano). New projects providing services beginning in the 1996-97 year include: North Coast (Eureka), Sacramento College Horizons, and San Jose.

The Cal-SOAP program is administered by the California Student Aid Commission, with individual projects applying each year for continued state funding. By law, each state allocation must be matched by an equal or higher level of local resources. The Student Aid Commission is assisted in administration of the program by a 12-

member, legislatively mandated advisory committee.

In the 1995-96 fiscal year, an initiative was passed allocating \$500,000 annually in Proposition 98 funds to expand existing Cal-SOAP projects and create two new sites in Eureka and San Jose.

Cal-SOAP has extensive intersegmental participation, including:

- More than 28 public school districts, from the largest urban areas to small, rural districts;
- Seven of the eight general campuses of the University of California;
- Eleven of the 22 campuses of the California State University System;
- More than one-fifth (22) of the state's 107 community colleges--including all those in each area where a project is located;
- Fifteen members of the Association of Independent California Colleges and Universities; and
- Ten other members representing private secondary schools, community organizations and state organizations.

(These figures do not include the consortia members of the newer Cal-SOAP projects, North Coast, San Jose or Sacramento.)
