California Student Opportunity and Access Program (Cal-SOAP) Project Directors Report

Consortiums just completed the operating overlap of 2014-15 Quarter 4 and 2015-16 Quarter 1. The overlap of fiscal years has caused questions regarding data collection and budget reports. Project Directors are working with CSAC staff to determine best solutions.

Follow Up on Request for College Going Data on Cal SOAP Schools

Attached as Item 6.1 is a sample of data being collected to present a report on College Going Data from all Cal SOAP high schools (consortiums work with a total of 199 high schools in 71 districts).

A complete set of data will be presented to the Commission when completed.

Notes from Long Beach Consortium Schools

- All high schools have over 75 % graduation rate
- A-G Completion Rate range from a low of 16% to a high of 56%
- AP Course Offered range from a low of 4 to a high of 33

Consortium Highlights:

Central Coast –

- The Central Coast Cal-SOAP organized and hosted the Young Educated Latino Leaders conference on October 3, 2015. This inspiring event was created to convince high school students to capitalize on their potential and graduate from high school, then proceed to College and or University. Local leaders presented their experiences, and a young Latino actor came from Los Angeles to speak to and inspire the students, and a video was presented to the students of their parents speaking about what they want for their children and their futures.

Central Valley –

- 100 to UC Merced Campus Visit - In September, Central Valley Cal-SOAP took 119 high school students from our area to UC Merced to do a campus tour, student panel regarding majors and research, lunch and closing from Dean of Students at that campus. Students all acknowledged they learned a lot from our up and coming UC in our area and will be applying there as seniors.

California Student Aid Commission

- Fresno Area College Night - In September, Central Valley Cal-SOAP partnered with our high schools to chaperone Fresno Area College Night where thousands of valley students went to well over 100 booths from different institutions and campus programs, CTE related careers, and resources for them. Central Valley Cal-SOAP also presented a workshop for families towards "College Making it Happen".

Long Beach –

- Long Beach completed its 5th annual College Prep Summer Camp. The summer before 12th grade, students are invited to attend a camp to get a preview of what's ahead in all aspects of college admission and financial aid. Since 2011, the College Prep Summer Camp program has assisted over 1,000 rising seniors enter the school year prepared to apply for college and financial aid.

San Diego –

- Scholarship Workshop --300 students and parents, September 19
- Jump Start 12th Grade -150 students and parents-September 23
- High School Senior Nights-1,500 students and parents (various nights)
- Got Plans Career and College Fair in Grossmont District - 2,000 students and parents, October 10 Sweetwater Union College Fair-2,000 students and parents, October 5
- College Workshop with Assemblywoman Toni Atkins and Congressman Scott Peters, October 14
- San Diego and Imperial Counties College Fair, October 20 with 5,000 students and parents and over 100 reps.
