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This memorandum is intended to provide a CSAC update of activities and issues as they might impact our programs, issues of postsecondary access and financial aid generally. Attached to this update is additional information for your reference.

**2005-06 Cal Grant Award Cycle:** Attached is a copy of the latest number of awards for Commission programs broken down by segment. You will see that all segments have seen an increase in Cal Grant awards, with the Community Colleges seeing an increase of 8.7% over last year. The Cal Grant C awards have also gone out, with the majority of awards going to students attending Community Colleges.

**Commission Supports "Community College Financial Aid Awareness Month":** In support of "Community College Financial Aid Awareness Month," for the first time the Cal Grant GPA Verification Forms were made available to students beginning in May 2005. California Community Colleges received drop shipments commencing April 29<sup>th</sup> of this year. At the request of CCCSFAAA's High School Relations Committee, the Commission also sent 50 copies of the September GPA Verification forms to accredited high schools to assist students who missed the March 2<sup>nd</sup> award deadline.

To further support the Community Colleges outreach effort for the September 2<sup>nd</sup> Cal Grant Competitive program cycle, the Commission sent a supply of three posters and 10 brochures of Cal Grant Community College Outreach publications. Due to the short turnaround time, the Commission used last year's publications as a template in which to produce this year's materials. Some noteworthy changes include the addition of the [icanaffordcollege.com](http://icanaffordcollege.com) information on all the materials and the use of the color "orange" to connect with the Community College campaign.

**Continued Efforts to Improve Service Delivery:** The following projects continue to be a high priority for the Commission in our efforts to improve delivery:

- o **Web Access for Students:** We are on the verge of launching Web Access for Students. Commission staff presented the first phase of the project to the

Commissioners for feedback in April. Staff also solicited the input of the Commission's Advisory & Enhancements Workgroup. Due to scalability concerns, the Commission plans to "Beta test" the new program with a subset of approximately 10,000-20,000 students through August. Our hope is to go live with access to the program for all students in time for the September 2<sup>nd</sup> Cal Grant Competitive program cycle.

- **Interactive Voice Response System:** An interactive voice response system will be implemented in the Commission's Call Center in late August. Like Web Access for Students, this new system will allow students to check basic information via the phone system 24 hours a day. Commission staff presented their plan for this project to the Commission's Advisory & Enhancements Workgroup and will make some additional refinements to the project before it goes live in late August.
- **External Review of Cal Grant Letters:** In late June, the external review of system generated Cal Grant letters will begin. This will be the first time in the 50 year history of the Commission that stakeholders will come together to assist the Commission in making comprehensive changes to Cal Grant letters. If all goes as planned, the review should take 3-4 months with testing and implementation of suggested changes taking place during the fall in time for the 2006-07 awarding cycle.
- **GPA Imaging Optimization Project:** As part of the Commission's efforts to provide improved access for students to the Commission's programs, the Commission is working with its auxiliary on an exciting two part project to improve students' ability to submit a GPA to the Commission for Cal Grant consideration. The first phase of this project involves allowing students to download the GPA verification form from the Commission's website (or Web Access for Students) and mail it to the Commission for processing. As some of you may know, students currently do not have the ability to do this because the vendor with which the Commission contracts for the GPA Verification forms can not guarantee the accuracy of downloaded GPA Verification forms. Using Intelligent Character Recognition Imaging options, CSAC and EDFUND hope to provide a new form and process for the processing and transmittal of GPAs. The second phase of this project would allow students to electronically request that their school submit their GPA to the Commission on their behalf. We hope to have the first phase of this project in place for next year's award cycle.

**Commission Outreach Efforts:** The Commission is in the process of developing a new comprehensive outreach plan that integrates all the Commission's programs including Cal Soap, Cash for College, outreach grantees and the Commission's public relations campaign. Due to declining revenues within the Student Loan Operating Fund, Commission staff has been instructed to develop a plan that priorities the Commission's outreach activities and does a better job of targeting the neediest students. New data from the Commission's research staff demonstrates that up to approximately 77,141 students who submit a FAFSA but neglect to submit a verified GPA could be eligible for a Cal Grant award (see attached analysis). These startling numbers indicate a need to continue an aggressive outreach campaign, and calls for continued coordination between all stakeholders in this important effort. The Commission continues to be interested in working collaboratively with the California Community Colleges to maximize

outreach resources, improve messaging and improve coordination of outreach activities in the coming year for the benefit of students.

**New School Support Services Branch:** The new School Support Services branch is now in place within the Commission's Program Administration & Services Division. As you know, the School Support Services Branch was created as part of the Grant Services Division reorganization in an effort to better assist schools in administering the Commission's programs. The new School Support Services Branch is responsible for providing year-round training throughout the state for schools and for program policy and communications with schools. In addition, the School Support Services Branch works to ensure that program policy and operational issues are reviewed internally with special attention to school concerns.

As part of the Commission's continued efforts to better serve the school community, I am pleased to announce that Ms. Thea Pot-Van Atta has been hired to serve as the manager of the new School Support Services Branch. Ms. Pot-Van Atta comes to the Commission with over 20 years of financial aid experience. For much of her time in financial aid, she has been the campus coordinator for the Cal Grant program. Given her background, she intricately understands the administration of the Commission's programs from a school perspective. Her extensive experience makes her uniquely qualified for this important position. Ms. Pot Van-Atta will work with me directly to identify ways in which the Commission can streamline the administration of the Cal Grant program with special attention to student and school needs.

**Cal Grant Forums:** The Commission has completed nine "Cal Grant Forums" statewide designed to gather input from the financial aid community and other interested parties regarding how the Commission is administering the Cal Grant program. Over 288 individuals representing 146 institutions attended the forums across the state. We have gotten some excellent feedback at the forums and plan to determine what changes we can make to accommodate consistent themes or issues heard across the state. Already we have implemented several of the changes suggested at the forums including changing the "denied low score" terminology of the Cal Grant Competitive program denial letters (see attached) and allowing the colleges to view a student's Cal Grant award scoring in detail so they can better advise and counsel students. Commission staff is currently working to process all the suggestions made at the forums and plans to give an update on next steps at the next Commission meeting.

**Advisory Groups Meet:** Two of the Commission's advisory groups met since my last report to you:

- ❖ ***Grant Advisory Committee (GAC)***—Unlike last year, the GAC met again for its Spring meeting on May 19<sup>th</sup>. Some of the items for discussion included the Commission program enhancements and research projects, an update on state and federal legislation and budget, and the Commission's efforts on high school GPA transmittals. GAC is tentatively scheduled to meet again in August upon the call of the chair.
- ❖ ***Advisory & Enhancements Workgroup Meeting (A&E)***—The Commission's A&E Workgroup met on May 26<sup>th</sup>. Among the topics of discussion were the Commission's Grant Delivery System conversion to real-time, Web Access for Students, the Interactive Voice Response System and other WebGrants

enhancements. A&E will meet again on July 21<sup>st</sup> and every other month thereafter. Anyone in the field who would like to participate is welcome. For more information, please see the attached Special Alert and "Interest Form."

**State Budget:** In the Governor's May Revision amendments to his January state budget proposal, the Governor restored funding reductions to the Cal Grant award for students attending private colleges and universities back to this year's current level of \$8,322. Additional proposals included the following:

- ❖ The creation of a new program, SMART-APPLE, which would target students in UC/CSU math and science teacher programs;
- ❖ First phase of funding for changing the Grant Delivery System to a real-time database; and
- ❖ Two limited term positions to support the Commission's Call Center.

The budget is now in the Legislative Budget Conference Committee, where the Assembly and the Senate are working out differences between the two houses. As of Friday, the Conference Committee had rejected funding for the Grant Delivery System conversion to real-time, as well as the creation of the SMART-APPLE program. Instead, the Conference Committee approved an additional 300 new APPLE awards with priority going to math and science teachers.

Commission IT staff continue to remind everyone that if the funding for the "real-time" conversion does not pass the Legislature, the Commission will be limited in its ability to make significant improvement to service delivery over the course of the next several years, including some of the more significant changes suggested by schools. For this reason, the funding for this project continues to be a significant priority for the Commission.

Since the Conference Committee has not yet completed its work, anything could happen between now and the signing of the budget. Commission staff is monitoring the situation carefully.

### Potential High School Entitlement Applicants with FAFSA but no High School GPA

For the 2005-06 Cal Grant award year, the Student Aid Commission received FAFSAs from 173,425 California resident, dependent students aged 20-and-under whose parents' income was below the income and asset ceilings for Cal Grant eligibility.

The following table shows the number of these applicants who submitted FAFSAs and whether they also submitted a verified high school GPA – the two minimum requirements all applicants must meet to be considered for High School Entitlement award eligibility:

Finally, the Commission received 230,462 non-duplicated high school GPAs for the 2005-06 award year. Of these certified high school GPAs:

- 80,739 California resident applicants aged 19-and-under and 2,004 of the 20-year-olds also submitted a FAFSA, but
- 143,514 of the GPAs submitted to the Commission were for potential freshmen college students who never applied for financial aid at all.
- Why is it that some high schools are far better at sending the Commission the GPAs of graduates who come from families with high incomes than these same high schools or others are in sending the Commission the GPAs of low income graduates who will likely need financial aid and a Cal Grant to attend college?

## **Completed Cal Grant Applications, HS Entitlement Offers, FAFSAs without GPAs by Zip Code and High School**

The following table identifies the 63 zip codes in 13 California counties, including 33 zip codes in Los Angeles County, that were listed by 100 or more 2005-06 FAFSA filers who did not submit a verified GPA to complete the Cal Grant application process. It also identifies the 146 public and private, regular, adult, and continuation high schools located in these zip codes. Because the zip codes were taken from the applicants' home addresses, there is not always a consistent match between these zip codes and the high schools the students may have attended. In some zip codes there is only one high school, but in others there are up to four so it is not always possible from these data to accurately identify the school(s) with large numbers of incomplete Cal Grant applications. To help to place this issue in perspective, the number of seniors at each of the high schools, the number who submitted completed Cal Grant applications, and the number receiving High School entitlement offers were also included.

- The 146 high schools in these zip codes had a total of 43,515 seniors last year;
- Of these, 13,880 submitted complete Cal Grant applications with both a FAFSA and a verified high school GPA;
- In all, 9,343 of these applicants received High School Entitlement offers for 2005-06;
- An additional 8,733 students submitted FAFSAs but no GPA and therefore their eligibility for a possible Cal Grant High School Entitlement award could not be determined;
- For some zip codes and high schools the gap between the number of seniors and the number who submitted complete applications was so wide, the problem school(s) with large numbers of students failing to complete the process was both clear and alarming; but
- At a few other high schools, the number of completed applications plus incomplete applications when compared to all seniors is so high that it serves as a reminder that while the 18-year-olds and some of the 19-year-olds who submitted FAFSAs without GPAs graduate this year, other 19- and 20-year-olds included in the count of applicants with incomplete applications probably graduated one or two years earlier.
- High School Entitlement Awards are limited to those who apply within 18 months of their high school graduation, submit a FAFSA and a verified GPA, and meet the program's other eligibility requirements. Clearly, those applicants who were not still high school seniors at the time they applied appeared to have greater difficulty getting verified GPAs submitted.
