HIGHLIGHTS 2006-2007

Advising Activities

High School And College Advising - Ongoing

EBC has provided supplemental high school and college advising to over 1,300 students. The number of students served includes students served through the College/Career Information Centers, four live TV shows on KDOL focused on high school, college, and financial aid advising, individual advising, and group workshops at various schools and community organizations.

KDOL (TV) /Counselor Community Connection -- CCC Live! - Ongoing

In an effort to reach more parents and students regarding school, college and financial aid, the Consortium has aired two live TV shows on KDOL, OUSD's TV station. CCC Live! guest speakers included financial aid officers, counselors, and CSAC representatives, students, parents and college students. The format of the shows allows students, parents and community to talk directly over "hotline" phones with a panel of volunteer student and staff "experts". We estimate that 500 students and parents were reached through this effort. The following shows were completed and aired at least four times: College: Making It Happen For You and Cash for College; in May and June of 2006 we will also air the following shows: Summer Opportunities For Youth; Scholarship Winners.

College/Career Information Centers - Ongoing

The Centers at Castlemont Community of Small Schools and Life Academy High Schools in collaboration with Consortium members and other educational/community organizations, have provided information and advising services related to college admission, financial aid, and other topics associated with pursuing a higher education to over 600 students and parents.

29th Annual College Day at UC Berkeley - September 30, 2006

Over 1,500 students and parents participated in the event and more than 60 college recruiters were represented. The goal for College Day is to provide a positive experience that will stimulate middle school and high school students to explore college choices and opportunities. Workshops on financial aid and college admissions in English and Spanish were amongst the informational and hands on workshops offered to students and parents. A College Making It Happen workshop for over 100 middle school students and parents was also offered during this event.

Cash for College - Various Dates in January and February

The East Bay Consortium/Cal-SOAP (EBC) in conjunction with local elected officials and the East Bay Cash for College Coalition hosted 50 Cash for College Workshops—for high school seniors in the East Bay. EBC was the East Bay Regional Coordinator for the statewide CCFC effort, supporting and encouraging colleges, high schools, programs and individuals in establishing their own Cash for College events. EBC trained about 30 college staff and 30 community volunteers in two training sessions. We had the pleasure of working with over 80 volunteers in total, many of whom worked at more than one event. Over 2,500 students and 1,400 parents attended the workshops which were held throughout Alameda and Contra Costa counties.

I'm Going to College Program - April 27, 2007

This year the East Bay Consortium worked with 260 5th graders from 4 elementary schools: International Community School, Jefferson Elementary School and Think College Now in Oakland, and Washington Elementary School in Richmond. After a 6-week curriculum taught by their teachers, students applied to UC Berkeley and were accepted as honorary college students. They received financial aid checks to "buy" their backpack full of school supplies and information, t-shirt, ID badge, tuition, and lunch. Moreover, students and parents experienced a day of tours and classes that included Biology, Chemistry, Nutritional Science, Music, Comparative Literature, Ethnic Studies, History, and Basketball. About 50 parents and 8 teachers participated in the field trip, along with over 80 staff and volunteers.

Transfer Making It Happen (TMIH) - Ongoing

TMIH works with a core group of students at 2 high schools and 1 community college. The high school program encourages and assists students at Castlemont and Life Academy high schools through the process of attending a community college with the goal to transfer to a four-year college or university. TMIH provides college advisement through informational monthly meetings, assignments, and fieldtrips to help facilitate the transfer path. The TMIH program at Contra Costa College focuses on providing services to assist community college students in the process of transferring to a four-year college or university. Over 50 students have been served in 2006-2007.

Mentoring - Ongoing

100 Pre-Collegiate Academy students were provided with college student mentors for the academic year. Every college student staff mentors an average of 5 PCA students. Their role as mentors is to follow up on the student's academic progress in school, to engage students in activities that encourage them to continue to do well in school as well as maintain close contact with other PCA students on the road to college. Activities include college field trips, completing college and financial aid applications, participating in leadership conferences, parents meetings, home visits focused on goal setting and future planning, etc.

ACADEMIC ACTIVITIES

Pre-Collegiate Academy - Ongoing

For the past 17 years, one of the highlights of our program is the Pre-Collegiate Academy (PCA). PCA was established to increase the number of students from low socio-economic backgrounds who qualify for and attend colleges and universities. The PCA works to accomplish this goal by strengthening students' mathematical and literacy skills through a five-week summer enrichment program and support services during the academic year. 153 students participated in 2006-07.

PCA Saturday Program - Fall and Spring

Over 18 families participated in Family Math and Family Science during the Fall and Spring semesters. Family programs introduce parents to math and science activities. Math for middle school and math and SAT prep program for high school students was offered to over 80 students. Programs were held at St. Elizabeth High School. 9 Saturday sessions of 2.5 hrs each.

Tutoring - Ongoing

EBC provides tutoring at ten schools, 4 middle schools and 6 high schools. Over 300 students have been served. Basic core subjects such as math, science and English, as well as other requested subjects are available.

Greater Long Beach Regional Cal-SOAP Program

The Greater Long Beach Regional Cal-SOAP program provides college awareness and academic preparation services to 15 high schools, 4 middle schools, 1 elementary school and one community site, totaling 21 service sites. As one of the newest Cal-SOAP projects, our Consortium has been in operation for 2 ½ years.

As of May 11, 2007, **7,460 students, grades 4-12, have been served by the Long Beach Regional Cal-SOAP program and have participated in over 15,481 activities through Cal-SOAP programs, activities or events during the 2006-2007 school year.**

2006-2007 Summary of Activities

Financial Aid Awareness **1,300 activities**

- **Financial Aid, Scholarships & FAFSA/Cal Grant workshops**, 927 students and 373 parents have participated in workshops on financial aid.
- **Financial Aid advising** for 580 students on an individual basis.
- **Cash for College**, sponsored 10 events for 655 parents and students.

Advising & College Awareness Activities **2,828 activities**

- **College Peer Advisors** placed at 7 high priority high schools and one community youth outreach center have provided 1,284 advising sessions. CPA's provide individual and small group advising, classroom presentations, staff college/career centers, and coordinate special college-related events at their assigned school sites.
- **College & Academic Preparation intensive workshops**, related topics are delivered in the classroom as a series of 3 workshops by a team of college peer advisors.
 - **Beyond High School:** (1) Introduction to College Systems; (2) A-G courses or Career Trends; and (3) Financial Aid. 24 Beyond High School workshops with 1,544 students.

Academic Preparation Activities **2,906 activities**

- **Tutoring.** Academic Coaches have provided 1,199 tutoring sessions in Algebra and pre-Algebra for 473 7th & 8th grade students at 4 middle schools and one after-school community site.
 - **After-School Tutoring** is available for high school students at the Youth Opportunity Center in the City of Long Beach.
- **College & Academic Preparation intensive workshops**, 42 workshops for 1,707 students.
 - **Study Skills:** (1) Note taking; (2) Time & Stress Management; and (3) Test-taking techniques
 - **Scholarship Searches & Essay Writing**

Community College Awareness **852 activities**

- **Transfer Day Fieldtrips** for 8 schools with 250 students. High school students traveled to a local community college & university campus on the same day for presentations on the transfer process, financial aid & campus tours.
- **Community College intensive workshops**, 9 workshops for 602 students.
 - **Community College Options:** (1) Intro to Comm College Options; (2) registration & exams; and (3) University Transfer pathways.

- **I'm Going to College** a 4 week classroom program & field trip to CSU Long Beach for 130 4th & 5th graders from McKinley Elementary School.
- **College Career Information Day** co-sponsor event. Middle school CCID event held at CSU Long Beach, 265 middle school students. Conference exposes students to various career pathways, college majors and a college fair.

6,888 activities

- **College Making It Happen** 245 students & parents participated in CMIH parent nights at all 4 middle schools.
- **Parent & Family College School Events** have been provided to 460 parents and families.
- **College Career Info Night** partner event, approximately 4,000 students and their parents attended a college & career fair held at CSU Long Beach with approximately 200 college representatives.
- **Hispanic Outreach Taskforce Parent Conference** conducted college workshops and a parent panel for 300 middle school parents.
- **Long Beach Unified Parent Summit** included college related workshops and a resource fair for 827 parents and 556 students.
- **Compton Family Conference and Diversity Celebration.** 500 parents and students are expected to participate on May 19, 2007. A college fair and diversity celebration will follow a morning of college preparation, academic success and financial aid workshops for parents and students.

2006-07 Summary Of Activities

Peer Advisement/Tutoring - Ongoing

Cal-SOAP recruited, hired and training 15 tutors to do college advisement and academic tutoring at 12 consortium high schools. Cal-SOAP tutors receive training in the following topics: Systems of Higher Education, A-G Requirements, Transcript Evaluations, Financial Aid and Building Rapport with High School-age Students. Tutors were also given AVID training.

Financial Aid Information - Ongoing

In addition to the Cash for College Workshops that were available, Cal-SOAP Peer Advisors also worked with students one-on-one at the various Cal-SOAP school sites to assist them in learning more about the Cal Grant opportunities, and to fill out their FAFSA applications.

Campus Tours – Fall 2006

Cal-SOAP arranged campus tours for several of its high schools during Fall 2006: October 13, Tehachapi High School sent 27 students to CSUB; October 21, Cuyama Valley High School sent 8 students to Cal Poly San Luis Obispo; October 28, Cuyama Valley High School sent 8 students to Allen Hancock College; November 11, Taft High School sent 12 students to UC Merced; November 11, Maricopa High School sent 2 students to UC Merced; November 17, Trona High School sent 21 students to CSU San Bernardino; November 29, Trona High School sent 21 students to Cerro Coso College.

Kern County College Night – September 12, 2006

Approximately 7,000 high school students and families attended the countywide event. This event included over 100 college and university representatives and offered a variety of higher education workshops for students and families to attend. Cal-SOAP staff were involved in the planning and coordination of this event.

Cash for College Workshops – January to March 2007

Eight regional/countywide workshops were coordinated for Kern County high school seniors and their parents. All Cal-SOAP staff, including tutors, were trained in the FAFSA and assisted with these workshops. In addition, the Cal-SOAP Project Director helped plan and coordinate the workshops. Approximately 300 students and 300 parents attended these events to receive assistance in filling out the FAFSA.

Kern County Scholarship Fund – Spring 2007

Cal-SOAP received a \$100,000 grant from the College Access Foundation to award scholarships to graduating seniors from Kern County and Cal-SOAP high schools. The competition was widely promoted, over 225 applications received, and 40-45 students will receive scholarships in amounts ranging from \$1,000 – 5,000, depending on the type of institution they attend. Selection criteria include financial need, first generation college students, and academic achievement.

HBCU Fair – February 8, 2007

Cal-SOAP helped organize the 3rd annual Historically Black Colleges and Universities recruitment fair in Bakersfield. This year's event was held at Bakersfield College and attracted 700 high school students. It included workshops on college systems, academic preparation, and financial aid, and a college fair with 25 representatives from HBCU's, as well as local colleges and universities.

Leaders in Life – March 29, 2007


Cal-SOAP also helped organize the 8th annual "Leaders in Life" conference in Bakersfield. "Leaders in Life" is a conference planned for youth by youth. It is open to 7th-12th grade students in Kern, Ventura, Santa Barbara and San Luis Obispo Counties. The vision of this conference is to bring together individuals from various races, economic backgrounds, and academic achievement levels. The conference will provide an opportunity for students who need to be inspired and encouraged such as those who may be struggling academically, with personal issues or home and family issues. The event consists of workshops and a resource fair that includes college representatives. 1,300 students attended this year.

College: Making It Happen! – April 21, 2007

A countywide event was coordinated and hosted on CSU-Bakersfield's campus. The Saturday event gathered approximately 1,000 middle school students and families from throughout Kern County to participate in the day's informational workshops, campus tour, and college resource fair. The Cal-SOAP consortium took the lead on planning and organizing this event, and we obtained the assistance of more than 70 volunteers.

I'm Going to College – May 8, 2007

Approximately 325 fourth-graders participated in this year's IGTC program. The communities involved in this event were California City, Cuyama, Maricopa, Rosamond, and Trona. The Cal-SOAP project staff visited these students in their classroom on a monthly basis from February through April providing them with lessons on college-going themes. Teachers were provided with workbooks and helped the students create college corners in their classrooms. The students then participated in the college campus field trip to CSU-Bakersfield during the month of May where they experienced being an honorary college student for the day and attending three classes with CSUB professors and athletes. Cal-SOAP staff return to the elementary schools to culminate the program with graduation ceremonies for the participating students and their families.

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Activity and Event Summary – 2006-2007

Academic Programs

Summerbridge Summer Program – Served 84 students in a 6-week intensive academic enrichment program.

Classroom Tutoring – Provided twice weekly in 47 middle schools & high schools (130 classrooms, approximately 3000 students) countywide.

Summerbridge Saturdays - Ongoing tutoring for Summerbridge students grades 7-12

Advising Programs

Fall Classroom Workshops - Program staff and college partners conducted 182 classroom workshops, serving an estimated 2,730 students. Topics included college options, transcript evaluation, and college applications.

Fall Individual/Small-Group Conferences - Program staff conducted 593 individual and small-group conferences with students to coach them through the college application process.

Winter Classroom Workshops - Program staff conducted 93 classroom workshops, serving an estimated 2,790 students. Workshops focused on financial aid (including Cal Grants) and the FAFSA application.

Cash for College - Project staff participated in the Sacramento Cash for College Coalition, organizing and staffing financial aid workshops (California Cash for College) at 12 local high schools and one community “mega-workshop.”

Winter Individual/Small-Group Conferences - Program staff conducted 615 individual and small-group conferences with students to coach them through the FAFSA and Cal Grant application process.

Spring Classroom Workshops (Juniors) – Program staff conducted 230 classroom workshops, serving an estimated 3,450 students. Workshops introduced college options and promoted college attendance, and taught transcript self-evaluation.

“College: Making It Happen” – In a regional partnership involving local community colleges and universities, CSU Sacramento hosted the annual, community-wide C:MIH event for middle-school students and parents.

Spring Individual/Small-Group Conferences - Program staff conducted 657 individual and small-group conferences with students to conduct intensive transcript review, promote registration for entrance exams, and explore college options.

“I’m Going to College” – Classroom curriculum and field trip to University of the Pacific for ~120 elementary school students.

Spring Classroom Workshops (Senior Exit Interviews) - Program staff conducted 93 classroom workshops, serving an estimated 2,790 students. In addition to the exit survey, workshops covered student loans and default prevention, and community college options (including the September 2nd Cal-Grant deadline).

Auxiliary Programs

Sacramento Cal-SOAP Scholarship – As a result of a grant from the College Access Foundation of California (formerly The Education Financing Foundation of California), the project will be able to award \$80,000 in scholarship assistance to students who received intensive services through the project’s advising program.

Sacramento College Horizons Scholarship – Through an existing scholarship fund administered by the Sacramento Region Community Foundation, three students received \$10,250 in scholarship aid.



Program Update
San Diego and Imperial Counties CSAC
Program and Activity Update July 1, 2006-
April 30, 2007

From July 1, 2006 to April 30, 2007, the San Diego and Imperial Counties Cal-SOAP Consortium has provided services to 19,000 students, 60% of which have been served intensively. In addition, over 4,000 parents have been served. Below is a summary of pertinent information by component and changes to occur in the 2006-2007 year:

Advisement Component (Central) works with 12th grade students about admissions and financial aid information:

- 6,350 students have been served, 53% of which have been served intensively.
- 5,250 seniors received transcript evaluation for A-G requirements.
- 4,532 seniors have met with a College Peer Advisor to discuss college planning (admission and financial aid information).
- 4000 students and parents attended the University/College Fair.
- Over 1,000 students and parents attended *Cash For College* events at 8 locations in the central San Diego region with over 80 volunteers from postsecondary education, lenders and school personnel to support the program.
- 60 student employees received 20 hours of training to work in 41 high schools.
- Created and distributed valuable publications, including SOAP SCOOPs and 18,000 Advisement and Admission Folders.
- Serves as head counselor in San Diego Unified District and works with all high school counselors in Sweetwater and Grossmont Union High School Districts.
- *Rewarding Scholarship Dreams* Reception and Award Ceremony for 180 Scholars.

**Summary of Activities
2006-2007**

- **Cal-SOAP Summer Experience at SBCC**

In collaboration with Santa Barbara City College, Cal-SOAP provided a summer program for students entering 12th grade in Fall '06. The program consisted of a combination of a class taught by Cal-SOAP staff, based on Coveys "7 Habits of a Highly Successful College Student", and a class of the students choice at SBCC. Students made a campus visit and participated on a weekly basis in cultural activities relating to their course.

- **College Fair at Santa Barbara City College**

Santa Barbara Cal-SOAP, along with the Scholarship Foundation of Santa Barbara, Santa Barbara City College, Westmont College, and UCSB, co-sponsored the College Fair held annually in October. This event, brought more than eighty college representatives to Santa Barbara and served more than 1,000 students and parents

- **Tutor /Peer Advisor Program**

In 2006-07, fifty-eight Tutor/Peer Advisors from local colleges were hired to work in all the secondary schools of the Santa Barbara and Carpinteria School Districts, as well as at Bishop Garcia Diego High School, two elementary schools, and local Boys and Girls Clubs. As of April '07, 4,740 unduplicated students had been provided with tutorial services. The Tutor Training was a credit class (ED 295) through SBCC. The Tutor/Peer Advisors also earned pre-professional hours for their time tutoring.

- **College Campus Visits**

Cal-SOAP sent Consortium students on thirty-six campus visits in 2006-07. Approximately 835 students in groups of 20-30 participated in these trips to all the colleges in the Consortium. (SBCC, Westmont College, UCSB, CSUN and CSUCI)

- **Junior High School Incentive Program (JHIP)**

On a weekly basis, five eighth graders along with a teacher were chosen to tour one of three colleges in the Consortium (SBCC, UCSB, or Westmont) Five middle and junior high schools participated on a rotating basis. Seventy-five students and fifteen teachers were served with this special intensive activity.

- **High School Incentive Program (HIP)**

Modeled on the very successful Junior High School Incentive Program (JHIP), HIP served sixty high school students and fifteen teachers in 2006-07.

- **College and Career Information Program (CCIP)**

This self-assessment/ inventory program assists students with the identification of skills, and value clarification. This program also assists students with the translation of this information into wise high school and college planning. CCIP is provided to all 8th graders. 1,730 students participated in this program in spring '07

- **SAT Prep Workshops**

A total of 160 students participated in the one-day SAT Preparation Workshops given in the fall and spring. The workshops, facilitated by KAPLAN Test Services, were co-sponsored with the UCSB EAO Program.

- **Financial Aid Workshops**

Financial Aid Workshops administered by financial aid officers of the Consortium colleges and the Scholarship Foundation of Santa Barbara were provided for 1894 seniors in the five Consortium high schools. More than 250 parents also participated in workshops at five locations. All parent workshops were offered in both English and Spanish. There was a continuation of the effort this year to make sure that all seniors were submitting, not only a FAFSA, but also a GPA verification, to assure eligibility for Cal Grant consideration. Cal-SOAP also provided individual assistance (Cash for College) at Santa Barbara City College on two weekends in February in order that everyone who needed follow-up individual assistance was served. Overall, Cal-SOAP served more than 2000 students/families.

- **Cash for College Workshops**

Financial aid officers from the Consortium provided "one-on-one" assistance to students and parents from Consortium high schools at Santa Barbara City College on Saturdays : February 10 and 24 , 2007.

"I'm Going to College"

After participating in a two-month program designed to create an awareness in elementary school children of the opportunities of higher education, 112 4th grade students from Franklin Elementary School and Cesar Chavez Charter School, along with their teachers and parents, visited the University of California at Santa Barbara on May 23rd. The goal was to contribute to the creation of a "college going culture".

- **"Transfer Making It Happen"**

This extremely successful program intensively serves three of the high schools in the Santa Barbara Consortium as well as serving students at SBCC (100 students). Santa Barbara, Dos Pueblos, and Carpinteria High Schools have intensive programs. Bishop Garcia Diego High School had a four-part program in the spring.

- **SBCC Transfer Guidance Day**

On June 1, 2007, the high school TMIH students will be brought to the campus of Santa Barbara City College to meet the representatives of the college in the different departments (Transfer Center, Counseling, Admission, Student Activities and Financial Aid) This Conference, which is coordinated by Cal-SOAP and SBCC, provides one part of the required two-part orientation for all in-coming SBCC students.

- **"College, Making It Happen"**

Cal-SOAP was one of the collaborative partners in the "College, Making It Happen" event at the University of California at Santa Barbara, which took place on May 19, 2007. Cal-SOAP staff provided workshops for both parents and students. This collaborative effort, which is coordinated by UCSB EAOP, includes representative from all segments of the Santa Barbara Consortium. Four hundred students and parents were in attendance.

- **Cal-SOAP Clubs ("College 411")**

Junior and Senior High school students met on a monthly basis during their lunch period to discuss college-going topics and listen to speakers ranging from college graduates with interesting careers to college representatives. The groups were approximately 20 in size at each participating school site. Cal-SOAP Club students also have the opportunity to participate in additional Cal-SOAP college visits.

SUMMARY OF ACTIVITIES 2006-2007

ACADEMIC INTENSIVE

Academic Preparation Courses (101 students)

- ☼ Ninth and Tenth graders enrolled in Academic Prep receive 5 hours of instruction per week that includes, study skills curriculum, note-taking strategies, AVID curriculum, essay writing, and academic monitoring, college preparation workshops, and guest speakers from the four systems of higher education. The class also includes a campus tour and college workshop at Stanford University for eligible ninth graders.

After School & In-Class Tutoring (1100)

- ☼ 10 Elementary Schools, 5 Middle Schools, and 7 High Schools have After School Homework Centers staffed with Cal-SOAP tutors and/or receive academic tutoring assistance from Cal-SOAP tutors during the school day, paid for with in-kind cash from both the ASES, AVID and Migrant Education programs.

Academic Advising (500 students)

- ☼ Unique to the South County Consortium, our Staff members and Lead Tutors are housed at individual school sites, in order to take on the responsibility of one-on-one academic advising on an every day basis. Academic Advising includes, but is not limited to, four year plans, parent conferences, and mandatory tutoring contracts.

Summer Bridge (70 students)

- ☼ Students attended a 6-week Summer Bridge Program at Gavilan Community College. They earned 6 units by taking two freshmen level college courses, attended two leadership seminars, 1 college tour, frequent motivational speakers, one-on-one tutoring, and two evening workshops with their parents. 100% of the participants were enrolled at Gavilan College as Freshmen during the 2006-07 school year

ACADEMIC GENERAL

After School & In-Class Tutoring (600 Students)

- ☼ Cal-SOAP tutors provide tutoring for all students on a drop-in basis @ 8 schools.

Academic Advising (400 students)

- ☼ Cal-SOAP Staff are essential to the coordination and operations of three large high school's College and Career Centers. Our Program Advisors and Lead Tutors serve students in small groups, large groups, and often one-on-one on a drop in basis. Transcript evaluations, College and Scholarship essay editing, SAT or ACT preparation, and interpretation of state mandated test scores are common examples of academic advising for general students.

ADVISEMENT INTENSIVE

Financial Aid Initiatives (2000 students, 250 parents)

- ☼ South County Cal-SOAP offered financial aid workshops in the classrooms, for almost 2000 high school seniors in our consortium. Seniors apply for their FAFSA pin number on-line during the workshop, are educated on other financial aid opportunities, and leave with an invitation for their parents to attend evening workshops, or Cash for College Events to complete the actual FAFSA.
 - ☼ Financial Aid workshops were repeated in the evening at 7 high schools, in order to deliver the same information to parents of seniors. 15 Financial Aid Evening Workshops total were held at SCCC high schools between December 2006 and April 2007.
 - ☼ South County Cal-SOAP participated in 4 separate Cash for College events in January and February as well as five FAFSA Follow-Up sessions in May. We coordinated efforts with Gavilan College to not only assist with the March 2 deadline, but to also follow up with students in need of assistance with their Student Aid Reports.
-

Parent Outreach (over 10,000 parents)

- ☼ This year, a Parent participation committee was formed in order to increase the number of parents who attend SC Cal-SOAP Workshops. The Parent Advisory Committee members also participated in the planning and coordination of big events.
- ☼ Cal-SOAP staff, along with UC, CSU, Community College and Private University representatives, have held over 20 parent workshops in all SCCC high schools, as well as one at the local community college for middle school and high school parents and students and works together with secondary staff with 8th grade registration and recruitment nights.
- ☼ In addition to monthly workshops, Cal-SOAP staff utilizes the schools' automated dialer system, the schools' quarterly newsletters, the schools' bulletin announcements, the Cal-SOAP Bilingual Newsletter, the school websites, and the SCCC website to inform parents of upcoming workshops, programs, and activities.
- ☼ Sixty-nine 10th grade parents attended Cal-SOAP & Gilroy High School's advising nights to review test scores, study skill strategies, transcripts, and A-G requirements.

College Tours (170 intensive students)

- ☼ 50 seniors from four different high schools visited a Community College campus. During the campus tours, they participated in college and financial aid workshops as well as team building activities.
- ☼ 80 high school students participated in a CSU Stanislaus tour that included a student panel, and an evaluation.
- ☼ Over 50 students toured Gavilan College as part of a Cal-SOAP sponsored TMIH event.
- ☼ 34 high school juniors participated in WACAC at Mission College.
- ☼ 49 ninth graders from the Academic Prep classes toured Stanford Univ. with Project Motivation
- ☼ 85 high school juniors attended the 4-day No. California College Tour with SCCC Cal-SOAP.

I'm Going To College

- ☼ Over 200 5th graders completed the 6 week IGTC curriculum, helped build the "college corners" in their classrooms, participated in a college adventure at UC, Santa Cruz.

Transfer: Making It Happen (54 high school seniors & 100 community college students)

- ☼ 54 TMIH students received intensive advising, and individualized financial aid & essay writing assistance, and community college enrollment assistance in accordance with their individual TMIH contracts.

ADVISEMENT GENERAL**College: Making It Happen (800 students)**

- ☼ The CMIH curriculum was presented in 30 8th grade classrooms. A culminating event was held at Gavilan College's Gav Fest for 8th-10th grade parents and students from 13 middle and high schools. The final CMIH event was held on Saturday, April 21st, where parents and students attended a financial aid workshop, an A-G workshop, and a college application workshop.

Careers after College (over 50 students)

- ☼ A 2-hour career curriculum for 9th-11th grade students, presented in a class/computer lab setting.

College Fairs (322 students; 53 parents)

- ☼ SCCC proudly hosted their second annual College Fair at Gilroy High School on November 9th, 2006. Over 50 University representatives participated and almost 400 students and parents were in attendance.

Making It Count! (1600 students)

- ☼ Making It Count's one hour self-esteem building, and college awareness presentation were brought to students at Gilroy High School.
- ☼ Ninth, Eleventh, and Twelfth grade students attended a one hour motivational workshop:
 - 9th Grade – "Making High School Count"
 - 11th Grade – "Making College Search Count"
 - 12th Grade – "Making College & Career Count"
