

This document displays data about the 2012-13 *Competitive* Cal Grants awarded to recipients. It also includes data for students who filed their application on time and were financially eligible but did not receive an award (qualified non-recipients).

# **Cal Grant**

#### **Competitive Program**

**Under Senate Bill 1644** (Chapter 403, Statutes of 2000), California students who do not receive an Entitlement Cal Grant A or B award may compete for 22,500 Competitive Cal Grant A and B awards. These awards are not entitlements.


Fifty percent of the Competitive Cal Grant A and B awards are available to all students who meet the eligibility criteria and apply by the March 2<sup>nd</sup> Cal Grant application deadline. The remaining fifty percent are reserved for students who will be enrolled at a California Community College. A California Community College student is eligible to apply at the March 2<sup>nd</sup> or the September 2<sup>nd</sup> Cal Grant application deadline.

Schools seeking to participate in the Cal Grant Program must meet various statutory

eligibility requirements. Beginning in 2011-12, an additional requirement for institutional eligibility was implemented which required schools to meet a federal student loan three-year Cohort Default Rate threshold. Beginning in 2012-13, a second requirement for institutional eligibility was implemented which required schools to meet a graduation rate threshold.


The data in this document reflect the 2012-13 Competitive Cal Grants awarded to qualified applicants who applied by one or both deadlines and received awards or were financially eligible to receive an award (qualified non-recipients). A qualified applicant may be attending or planning to attend an eligible or ineligible Cal Grant school.


## **Competitive Cal Grant**


Award requirements include financial and basic eligibility and a minimum 2.0 GPA. Cal Grant B awards provide up to \$1,473 for books and living expenses for first-year students. Beginning with the recipient's second year of attendance, Cal Grant B awards also help pay for tuition and fees at public or independent four-year colleges or other qualifying institutions. Of these Cal Grant B awards, 11,501 were made for the March 2<sup>nd</sup> deadline, while 53 percent, or 12,779 awards, were made for the September 2<sup>nd</sup> deadline.



# **Competitive Cal Grant Qualified Non-Recipients**


Applicants must meet multiple criteria to qualify. Submitting both the Free Application for Federal Student Aid and the Cal Grant GPA Verification Form is the first step for students to be considered for a Competitive Cal Grant. For 2012-13, over 317,500 students were successful in meeting the financial and basic eligibility criteria. Additional eligibility criteria may include a disadvantaged high school experience, an orphan or ward of the court status and the size of the applicant's family relative to household income. About one out of twelve, or 8 percent, of the qualified students received awards. More than 291,300 qualified students remained unserved.


