SUBJECT: 2020-21 Cal Grant C Awards

This Operations Memo from the California Student Aid Commission (Commission) provides an update on the 2020-21 Cal Grant C awards.

The Commission processed the Cal Grant C applicants and offered awards to students who indicated they will be pursuing a technical/occupational degree or vocational certificate, on their Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) /California Dream Act Application (CADAA).

Based on the initial Cal Grant C award cycle:

- Cal Grant C award offers were processed on June 8, 2020.
- Currently, 4,898 supplements have been returned for the 2020-21 Cal Grant C with over 4,519 awards offered.
- Institutions may now view new Cal Grant C recipients on their rosters.
- Students must complete the Cal Grant C Supplement via <u>WebGrants 4 Students</u> to confirm program eligibility.
- Schools can download the *Cal C Supplement Recipient Report* to confirm submission of students' Cal Grant C Supplement forms.
- California Community Colleges maximum award is \$1,094 for books and supplies.\* Students who have dependent children may be eligible for an access award up to \$4,000.\*\*
- Maximum award amount for other qualifying colleges and universities is \$2,462 for tuition and fees, plus an additional \$547 for books and supplies.\*
- The Commission will continue to process Cal Grant C award offers until all 7,761 awards are utilized.
- The <u>Cal Grant C Scoring Chart</u> shows the 2020-21 scoring summary.

\*Amounts are dependent on State budget allocations and are subject to change.
