

AB 540/SB 68







Who Are Our Undocumented Students?

Undocumented Students are foreign nationals for whom any of the following is true:



Someone who entered the country without inspection nor proper permission

Someone who entered the country with a legal visa but overstayed their visit limit

Someone who has or previously had Deferred Action for Childhood Arrival (DACA) status

Someone still in the process of legalizing their immigration status in the U.S.

Remember, our undocumented students come from dozens of countries all around the world

CA Dream Act Application – The Challenges

- More than half of California's undocumented students in postsecondary education (53%) do not fill out a California Dream Act Application (CADAA)
- Among undocumented students in postsecondary education who do fill out a CADAA, only 30% ultimately enroll and receive state financial aid
- Only 14% of California's estimated undocumented student population in postsecondary education receives financial aid to support their higher education goals




Percentage of change for CADAA applications submitted 2019-20 vs 2023-24 = -27.78%

Dream Act Application - Updates For 2024-2025



Why is the California Dream Act Application (CADAA) Changing?

- The CADAA is designed to align, as much as possible, with the FAFSA
- With the updated FAFSA means the new technical specifications must be mirrored in the CADAA for proper processing of the SAI (Student Aid Index)
- These updates also give CSAC the opportunity to make other enhancements to the CADAA





- Add CADAA training video to login/registration page
- Add notification of skip logic as FYI for students
- Update AB 540 criteria, requirements to qualify
- Re-word grade level question
- Make Help & Hints button more visible or display automatically
- Consistency with use of capitalization and pronouns throughout the form
- Embed AB 540 affidavit within online CADAA
- Supplemental Help & Hints on all tax return questions with visual aids
- Build parental signature into original submission, eliminate separate PIN creation process
- Create a CADAA Demo/Simulator
- Improve account registration process

What is AB 540?

AB 540, signed into law on October 12, 2001, authorizes any student, including undocumented students who meet specific criteria to pay in-state tuition at California's public colleges and universities

AB 540 is available to U.S. citizens, those with legal permanent resident status, undocumented immigrant student and non-immigrant students holding an approved "T" or "U" Visas.

What is SB 68?

SB 68 expands AB 540 to enable students to count years spent at a California Community College and Adult School towards AB 540 eligibility. Additionally, it allows the completion of an associate degree or satisfaction of the minimum requirements to transfer to the University of California (UC) or California State University (CSU) to meet the degree or unit requirements.

These new eligibility criteria expand possibilities for students educated in California to qualify for in-state tuition and state-based financial

AB 540 Requirements

Option A

3 years of high school coursework **and** 3 years of total attendance at any of these schools in California:

- Elementary School
- Middle School
- High School

Option B (SB 68)

3 years attendance (or equivalent) at any of these schools in California:

- High School
- Adult School
- Community College

Fulfill one of the following

- Graduate from a California high school
- Obtain a certificate of completion, GED, HiSet or TASC in California
- Attain an Associate degree from a California Community College
- Fulfill minimum transfer requirements for a UC or CSU




- Complete the sections listed as tabs at the top of the screen. The website will take the student through each section
- Click "Save Application" at the bottom of the page to save your responses. Click "Next" at the bottom of the page to go to the next section
- For detailed instructions and information about each question, click the information icon
- The answers to some questions will be prefilled with your registration information
- It is critical that students complete the application with their correct name and date of birth to avoid any unnecessary delays





What if a Student's Parent(s) Live in Another Country?

- Even if a parent/contributor lives in another country, they are required to provide their income and assets
- When that is not possible because there is no contact with the parents, students should complete the application as much as they can and then contact their college's financial aid office as soon as possible
- The college financial aid office will evaluate the situation and inform the student if they can override the need for parent information

AWARD AMOUNT

The California Student Aid Commission (CSAC) will award up to \$4,500 per academic year (up to \$2,250 per semester or up to \$1,500 per quarter) to 1,667 eligible students. The grant will be available to the student for up to 8 semesters or up to 12 quarters while they have an active Cal Grant A or B award. Cal Grant A recipients must have met Cal Grant B eligibility.





- Communicating consistently & vigorously
- Resources shared in Spanish & English
- Created a document explaining in very simple terms why every senior should submit a FAFSA or CADAA
- Published a FAFSA/CADAA reminder every week
- Held in-person application workshops



Las Lomas High School FAFSA/CADAA Team Most Improved March 2nd Level 5

- Partnered with Diablo Valley College
- Reminded about importance of submitting an application at every gathering of parents and families
- Presentations to their emerging English learners, first-generation students and other groups.





Best Practices: Pittsburg High School

Senior Enrollment Count: 812

Completed: 526

Changes made to increase submission rate:

- Summer school students created their FSA ID
- In September, completed FSA IDs during Gov/Econ classes
- Tracked the CSAC Report with their Google form daily



Pittsburg High School College and Career Team Most Improved March 2nd Level 8

The team stayed motivated by checking the Race to Submit every Sunday and Thursday morning.

Beginning with the 2024-25 academic year



- Cal Grant Reform would make an additional 150,000 students eligible for aid starting in 2024-25. This would include about 109,000 community college students who would become newly eligible for awards to cover nontuition expenses like food and housing
- A GPA requirement would no longer be required for community college students
- 2022-23 budget included \$500,000 for CSAC to begin implementing the Cal Grant changes

NOTE: Changes to the Cal Grant program will only occur if there is enough state revenue in 2024-25 to support the changes. There is a May 2024 "Revenue Trigger" that will determine if Cal Grant reform is enacted.



High School Entitlement (E1)

Awarding in January/February 2024

- Depending on timing of 2024-25 FAFSA release in December 2023
- Testing of ISIR uploads in GDS and new E1 process

Decrease confusion for students

- Provide maximum certainty to students
- Focus on prospective college freshmen

Cal Grant Reform (CG 2 & 4)

- May 2024 Revenue Trigger
- Will continue work in parallel to E1





2024-25 E1

Minor modifications to award process

- January/February through May Revenue Trigger
 - Will only run E1 award process during this period. Awards will run on a weekly basis over the weekend.
- Which students will get awarded?
 - Traditional high school entitlement students who are eligible for both (legacy and CGR)
 - Legacy only students will not get awarded during this window
- No transactions
 - Students and colleges will not be allowed to process any changes during this window
 - No school confirmations or school changes
- Cal Grant Rosters
 - Exploring options with the CSAC team
 - Award Status Extract




Current Maximum Yearly Cal Grant A, B & C Awards

- Students receive Cal Grants for a maximum of 4 years/400% except for mandatory 5-year programs or teacher credential programs
- Cal Grants are only for undergraduate programs
- Must be used at a Cal Grant eligible college in California
- Cal Grants can be put "on hold" for up to 2 years
- Cal Grant reform, when enacted, will change Cal Grants to a simplified Cal Grant 2 and Cal Grant 4

Community College Entitlement Cal Grant

September 2nd deadline

- The Community College Entitlement Cal Grant greatly increased the number of students eligible for financial aid at California Community Colleges
- Eliminated more than half of competitive awards from 41,000 to 13,000 but added
 TENS OF THOUSANDS of additional Entitlement Cal Grant awards
- Beneficial to students who miss the March 2nd deadline but are planning on attending a California Community Colleges
- **E3** benefitted more than 125,000 students in the 2022-23 academic year





Middle Class Scholarship (MCS)

Students must meet the following requirements:

- Complete a FAFSA or CA Dream Act Application by the priority deadline
- California resident attending a UC, CSU or CA Community
 College Bachelor's degree program;
- U.S. citizen, permanent resident or meet the requirements for AB 540 non-resident tuition exemption
- Meet certain income/asset and other financial aid standards; maintain satisfactory academic progress; not be in default on a student loan; and must not be incarcerated.
- Students may receive the MCS award for up to 4 years depending on education level when awarded

The Middle Class Scholarship (MCS) provides undergraduate students, including students pursuing a teaching credential, with a scholarship to attend a University of California (UC), California State University (CSU) or California Community College Bachelor's degree program. Students with family income and assets up to \$217,000 may be eligible (2023-24 academic year).

2023-24 MIDDLE CLASS SCHOLARSHIP INCOME CEILINGS

Dependent students and Independent students with dependents other than a spouse \$217,000

Independent students

Single, no dependents \$125,000 Married, no other dependents \$144,000





Students with Dependent Children (SWD)

For students attending any Cal Grant eligible school with a child 18-years-old or younger, whom they support 50% or more.

- Cal Grant A & B yearly maximum award: **\$6,000**
- Cal Grant C yearly maximum award: \$4,000

The Golden State Teacher Grant Program (GSTG) program will award up to **\$20,000** in Golden State Teacher Grants for students who are currently enrolled in an approved teacher preparation program. Participants must commit to work at a priority school in California for 4 years within 8 years of completing their program.



Foster Youth Access Award



Cal Grant B for **Foster Youth**

Foster youth can qualify for a new or increased Access Award to help cover the cost of attendance.

- Age requirements: in foster care on/after age 13, and under 26 years of age at the start of the academic year (July 1st)
- Available at California public colleges or private, non-profit institution.
- Award amount varies, based on enrollment level

Cal Grant A & B Access: Up to \$6,000 Cal Grant C Books & Supplies: Up to \$4,000

High School Entitlement Application Window Extended to foster youth who are under age 26, when they submit a high school GPA

Maximum Eligibility (duration) Provides up to 8 years of full-time enrollment

High School Entitlement Application Window Foster youth under age 26 on July 1st of the award year. Must submit high school GPA.

Application Deadline for HS Entitlement September 2nd for foster youth attending a **CCC**








Chafee Grant

For students who were a ward of the court or living in foster care, for at least one day, between the ages of 16 and 18.

- Pays up to \$5,000 annually to help foster youth pay for college or career/technical or vocational training
- Eligible participants must complete a one-time Chafee Grant Application but should also complete either the FAFSA or CA Dream Act Application
- Students can get assistance with the application at a Cash for College event
- Be a current or former foster youth who was a ward of the court, living in foster care, between the ages of 16 and 18







Learning-Aligned Employment Program (LAEP)

The Learning-Aligned Employment Program (LAEP) offers eligible students at public colleges and universities the opportunity to earn money to help defray their educational costs while gaining education-aligned, career-related employment. Eligible students should be from an underrepresented background and meet all the program criteria.

What is Matching?



Matching allows you to match the uploaded GPA to a financial aid application in the event the system doesn't automatically match them.

An unmatched application will not process for Cal Grant consideration.





Institutional Student Information Record (ISIR) Error Messages

If an error message appears when attempting to match GPAs first try to vary your search criteria, or edit the GPA, if applicable. In some cases, students may simply need to correct their FAFSA or Dream Act Application for matching to occur. If it is a Social Security issue (FAFSA) students may need to contact FAFSA (Federal Student Aid) to resolve.




High School Graduation Verification

Graduated: The student meets high school graduation requirements. All students will default to 'Graduated.' Only students with a Cal Grant will populate this list.

Not Graduated: The student is not expected to meet graduation requirements by December 31st of the award year. Students will receive a notification.

*Pending: Graduation cannot be determined because the student transferred to another school/district OR the student will be working toward meeting graduation requirements. Students will receive a notification.

* Students whose verification reflects as Pending will need to complete the G8 form via WebGrants for Students



Cal Grant awardees may also self-certify high school graduation via their WebGrants for Students portal, causing them to drop off your graduation verification list.


HOW TO APPLY

All students start the application process by completing and submitting either the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) \supseteq or CA Dream Act Application (CADAA).



Taking a "Gap Year" (or a semester off)

- High School Students who receive a Cal Grant but don't wish to use it immediately can place it "on hold" until they return to college
- A Cal Grant 'Leave of Absence' can be placed for as little as one quarter/semester or up to 200% of the award eligibility (2 academic years). The holds do not need to be consecutive
- When a Leave of Absence is placed on the Cal Grant, no eligibility is lost for that period





- Have students complete their applications as soon as possible once applications
 open in December, but no later than the PRIORITY deadline. If a student misses
 the Cal Grant filing deadline(s) they should still apply as other aid may be
 available
- Have students apply for financial aid regardless of income
- Students should add at least one California college on their financial aid application, even if they plan to study out-of-state
- Advise students to create their 'WebGrants 4 Students' account at mygrantinfo.csac.ca.gov after they complete their application
- Remind students to check their e-mail (including 'junk' and 'spam' folders) on a regular basis. We recommend that students use a personal email for financial aid or college applications - not a school email
- If students have a special circumstance, students need to contact the college financial aid office as soon as possible



- Financial aid experts and volunteers help complete applications
- Greatly **increases** the number of successful application submissions





The California Student Opportunity and Access Program (Cal-SOAP)

Established by the state legislature in 1978, each Cal-SOAP project specializes in serving students within its community so the types of programs and services may differ. However, the projects share the common goal of improving the flow of information about postsecondary education and financial aid awareness to students in need.

Some common services provided by the consortia include advising, FAFSA/CA Dream Act Application assistance, parent outreach, and college awareness workshops.


