California Non-SSN Contributor Tip Sheet

The FAFSA is experiencing several issues for contributors without SSNs. Should the student wait to start the FAFSA?



CSAC recommends that students begin the FAFSA and complete the student section as soon as possible. The most important thing is to get the application started, and once the student has completed and submitted their section, advise them to save their confirmation email.

Federal Student Aid (FSA) announced that they will resolve FAFSA submission issues for students who have a contributor without an SSN in the first half of March. At that time, FSA indicates that students can submit a fully completed FAFSA that includes contributor information.

Student's contributor does not have an SSN and needs to create a <u>StudentAid.gov</u> account.

The contributor without an SSN can make a StudentAid.gov account to contribute to the student's FAFSA. They may be asked to verify their identity through a series of questions. In case these questions do not appear, or the contributor is unable to answer the questions correctly, they will be instructed on the next steps to verify their identity.

On March 5, 2024, FSA announced that they have updated steps 2 and 3 of the account creation process for contributors without an SSN. The new process now automatically assigns a case number to the contributor by email if further Identity Verification is needed.





Should the contributor use their Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) or work-authorized Social Security Number to create a StudentAid.gov account?

CSAC has been advised that a contributor can enter their DACA/work-authorized SSN when creating their StudentAid.gov account. However, an Individual Taxpayer Identification Number (ITIN) should <u>not</u> be used when creating a StudentAid.gov account.

Student's contributor does not have an SSN and has started the StudentAid.gov account setup process. Now FSA is requiring identity verification. What are the contributor's next steps?

- FSA will automatically assign the contributor a case number. Once the case number is created, FSA will send a verification email in their preferred language (English or Spanish), including their case number and instructions on submitting identity verification documentation.
- The contributor will be asked to submit an Attestation Form (available in both English and Spanish) with copies of unexpired acceptable documentation. The completed form and documentation can be submitted to IDVerification@ed.gov.
- Contributors should NOT submit an Attestation Form or documentation to FSA until they have a case number; we have been advised that documents without a case number will not be processed.


The student's contributor does not have an SSN and was able to create a StudentAid.gov account. Now the contributor cannot complete their section of the FAFSA. What are the contributor's next steps?

CSAC is working with Federal Student Aid to resolve this issue. CSAC has started the California Non-SSN Contributor Follow-Up Email List to provide up-to-date

On February 20, 2024, FSA released steps for a student with a contributor without an SSN to submit a partial FAFSA, only if they have a critical deadline to meet. Please view the steps here. If needed, the student can complete the steps, which includes entering their contributor's tax information manually. Students will click on the link to "Provide Parent Information Manually."

However, their contributor will still need to login to provide consent to complete the application when the issues are resolved. Until contributors return to the application, the FAFSA will not generate the information needed so that a student can be considered for financial aid. Communications will be sent to students regarding completion of the application.



Should the student fill out a paper FAFSA?

The paper FAFSA is not recommended. FSA is prioritizing processing the online FAFSAs. CSAC recommends that the student start an online FAFSA first to avoid processing delays.
