
This document displays data about the 2007-08 Competitive Cal Grants awarded to recipients. It also includes data for students who filed their applications on time and were financially eligible but did not receive an award (qualified non-recipients). Under Senate Bill 1644 (Chapter 403, Statutes of 2000), California students who do not meet the eligibility criteria for an Entitlement Cal Grant award may compete for 22,500 Competitive Cal Grant awards. These awards are not an entitlement—not "guaranteed," as are the Entitlement Cal Grant awards. Competitive awards are limited to the statutory number.

Students apply for half of these grants (11,250) by the March 2 Cal Grant application deadline. The remaining grants (11,250) are required to be set aside for the September 2 application deadline for students attending a California Community College in the fall.

The document displays data from the 2007-08 Competitive Cal Grants awarded to students who applied by one or both deadlines and received awards or were financially eligible to receive an award (qualified non-recipients).




Award requirements include financial and basic eligibility and a minimum 3.0 high school grade point average (GPA) or a minimum 2.4 college GPA. Cal Grant A awards provide for full systemwide fees at the California State University and the University of California, as well as tuition support at independent California colleges and universities and private career colleges. Of these Cal Grant A awards, 1,172 were made for the March 2 deadline, while 24 percent, or 375 awards, were made for the September deadline.



Cal Grant A Awards by School Segment






Cal Grant A Awards by Age



Competitive Cal Grant


Award requirements include financial and basic eligibility and a minimum 2.0 GPA. Cal Grant B awards provide up to \$1,551 for books and living expenses for first-year students. Beginning with the recipient's second year of attendance, Cal Grant B awards also help pay for tuition and fees at public or independent fouryear colleges or other qualifying institutions. Of these Cal Grant B awards, 12,544 were made for the March 2 deadline, while 48 percent, or 11,531 awards, were made for the September deadline.




Competitive Cal Grant Program

Competitive **Cal Grant Qualified Non-Recipients**

Applicants must meet multiple criteria to qualify. Submitting both the Free Application for Federal Student Aid and the Cal Grant GPA Verification Form is the first step for students to be considered for a Competitive Cal Grant. For 2007-08, 148,439 students were successful in meeting the financial and basic eligibility criteria. Additional eligibility criteria may include a disadvantaged high school experience, an orphan or ward of the court status and the size of the applicant's famliy relative to household income. About one out of six, or 17 percent, of the qualified students received awards. More than 122,800 qualified students remained unserved.


