Grant Delivery System Modernization Project

The new Grant Delivery System Modernization Project (**GDSM**) replaced CSAC's WebGrants System with a more robust and improved user-friendly system.

New Cal Grant Expansion for CCC Students





- \$155.4 million to remove barriers to Cal Grant entitlements based on age and time out of high school for California Community College students
- Will greatly increase the number of students eligible for financial aid at California Community Colleges
- Competitive Awards drop from 41,000 to 13,000 with a March 2nd deadline



Cal Grant Expansion for California Community College Students

- In lieu of a high school GPA, applicants may submit a CCC GPA (at least 2.4 on a 4.0 scale for a Cal Grant A; 2.0 on a 4.0 scale for Cal Grant B) or can re-establish their GPA by completing at least 16 units of credit at CCC with at least a 2.0 GPA, as defined by CSAC regulations
- Students must apply no later than September 2
- Students receiving an award in this new program may remain eligible to receive their award after they transfer to a UC or CSU.
- Students transferring to a private institution, however, will be considered for a Transfer Entitlement or Competitive Cal Grant

Golden State Teacher Grant Program (GSTG)

- The Golden State Teacher Grant

- The California Student Aid Commission (CSAC) will award \$20,000 Golden State Teacher Grants to over 4,400 eligible students across California





Proposed Cal Grant Reform

Efforts to streamline and simplify the current Cal Grant system will make California's financial aid system more accessible to students who need support the most, including low-income students, student-parents, and returning learners

Under a **new legislative proposal** – AB 1456 (Medina, McCarty)—Cal Grant awards would reach nearly 200,000 more students and be restructured to better meet students' needs while maintaining existing levels of support for middle-class families. **Please note that this is only a proposal (among others) and not new legislation**

The California Student Aid Commission supports AB 1456



Financial Aid Application Completion Requirement

- Adopts a requirement that local education agencies will confirm that all their graduating seniors complete a financial aid application or an opt-out waiver
- Requirement for local education agencies begins in the 2022-23 High School academic year (for 2023 High School Graduates)
- Requires the Commission to develop regulations and standardized forms
- Allows a student to opt out for any reason and ensures they are not penalized Schools must use a standardized opt-out form
- Allows legal services organizations and immigrant resource centers to aid schools





The **Chafee Grant** is available to current and former foster youth who were dependent or wards of the court, living in foster care, for at least 1 day between the ages of 16-18. It will pay up to \$5,000 per academic year for eligible participants.








GPA Demographic Verification Form


Cal Grant GPA Opt-Out Form In order to be considered for a Cal Grant, California public high schools and charter schools are required to submit a high school Grade Point Average (GPA) to the California Student Aid Commission by October 1 for all graduating seniors, unless the student or parent has opted out. California Education Code section 69432.9 requires the school district or charter school, to notify all grade 11 pupils and their parent/guardian (if under the age of 18), in writing and no later than January 1 of a pupil's grade 11 academic year, that the pupil will be deemed a Cali Grant applicant unless the pupil has opted out prior to the date below (as specified by the high school). 


Notify juniors of GPA Opt-Out option

- California Education Code requires that students in 11th grade (and for minors, their parents/guardians) be given the opportunity to Opt-Out of being automatically considered as a Cal Grant applicant
- Notification to Opt-Out of the Cal Grant program, should be sent in writing, no later than January 1st of a student's junior year
- School districts and charter schools who have not notified their current juniors, are advised to send notifications as soon as possible and prior to the end of the academic year

Check your reports on WebGrants every week, beginning in late October, to see which students are not matching





The "No Cal Grant Zone"

- Students must meet certain income and GPA requirements to be considered for a Cal Grant
- A student may be over the income ceiling for Cal Grant B, but not have the minimum GPA of 3.0 for a Cal Grant A
- THOUSANDS of students don't receive a Cal Grant because they don't meet the 3.0 GPA requirement for Cal Grant A


Taking a "Gap Year"

- High School Students who receive a Cal Grant but don't wish to use it immediately can place it "on hold" for up to two academic years
- A Cal Grant 'Leave of Absence' (LA) can be placed for as little as one semester or up to 200% of the award eligibility (2 years). The holds do not need to be consecutive
- The student, the college or CSAC are all able to place an LA on the award, but we recommend the student does it via their WebGrants 4 Students account
- When a Leave of Absence is placed on the Cal Grant, no eligibility is lost for that period
- Failure to place a "Leave of Absence," or LA, on an active Cal Grant may result in losing the award



Special Circumstances

College Financial Aid Administrators have the authority to make certain adjustments to the information presented on the FAFSA or CADAA to help account for the unusual circumstances our students and their families encounter.

- Loss of job/income
- COVID-19 related hardships
- Divorce
- Death in the family
- Unexpected medical expenses
- Adverse home situations
- Dependency status
- Loss of home due to fire, etc.



Have students complete their applications as soon as possible **beginning October 1**st, but no later than the March 2nd **PRIORITY** deadline

1 OCTOBER

Have students apply for financial aid regardless of income

Instruct students to apply add at least one California college on their financial aid application, even if they plan to study out-of-state

Instruct your students to go to mygrantinfo.csac.ca.gov to create their 'WebGrants 4 Students' account after they complete their application. Students can check their status and confirm that a GPA has been uploaded

Remind students to check their e-mail (including 'junk' and 'spam' folders) on a regular basis. We recommend that students not use a high school or district e-mail for financial aid or college applications

Financial aid offer letters are not standardized. Each one is different. Read, compare and evaluate each financial aid offer with care.

When can students expect to receive a financial aid offer?

Generally, 2-to-3 weeks after acceptance at a four-year college and late spring to early summer from a community college.

Can aid offers change?

Yes! Offers can change based on further verification, budget finalization or other changes. That's why an initial aid offer is often referred to as "estimated", "pending" or "tentative".



Key Steps to Reading Your Financial Aid Offers

- 1. Start with the **full cost** including all categories of expenses
- 2. Then, look for your **"free money"** money you won't have to earn or pay back
- 3. Subtract to see your "**net price**" what you'll have to cover using savings, income, or loans
- 4. Make sure to **think beyond the first year** of college, as your financial picture can change, and you want to be prepared



Youth with Juvenile Justice Involvement



Youth who have been involved in the juvenile justice system can and do go to college!

Eligibility for financial aid programs is not affected by juvenile justice involvement. Youth are eligible for federal and state aid.

Many youth who have been involved in the juvenile justice system are foster youth, and are eligible to apply for Chafee Grants

Counselors at all schools should be aware that youth with juvenile justice involvement can qualify for financial aid.





Be Proactive

Push back against the narrative that youth who have been involved in the juvenile justice system aren't eligible for financial aid

Be Collaborative

Like many other students, youth in the juvenile justice system frequently change schools. Collaboration between school districts helps to ensure they are being reached

Be Inclusive

Make sure your financial aid outreach includes this cohort of students. Connect with local probation departments, courts and alternative schools if you can

Connect Early and Often to Higher Ed

Connect students to the Rising Scholars Network (community college), Project Rebound (CSU), and Underground Scholars (UC) programs



Homeless, Unaccompanied Youth

It is estimated by the California Coalition for Youth that there may be as many as 300,000 homeless youth between the ages of 12 and 17 years old on any given day in the state of California

Students are considered independent if they are determined to be Homeless Unaccompanied Youth by:

- The student's high school or school district homeless liaison, or
- The director of an emergency shelter or transitional housing program funding by HUD, or
- The director of a runaway or homeless youth basic center or transitional living program, **or**
- The college's financial aid administrator

LCBTQ Homeless Unaccompanied Youth

Lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender and queer/questioning (LGBTQ) youth are over-represented in the homeless youth population; estimates range from seven percent among youth receiving services to 39 percent among street youth. LGBTQ youth leave home more frequently and are exposed to more victimization while on the streets compared to heterosexual homeless youth.







What if a Student's Parents live in Another Country?




- Even if parents live in another country, they are required to provide their income and assets
- When that is not possible because, for example, there is no contact with the parents, students should complete the application as much as they can and then contact their college's financial aid office as soon as possible
- The FAO will evaluate the situation and inform the student if they can override the need for parent information



DACA Updates

- A federal judge in Texas ruled in July that Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA), a program that allows certain immigrants to temporarily avoid deportation and receive renewable work permits, is illegal and ordered the current administration to stop granting new applications
- The latest ruling will prevent the approval of at least 50,000 new DACA applicants nationwide who applied earlier this year but were not approved before the ruling, based on USCIS statistics

Current DACA Recipients

DACA protections and benefits will continue (i.e., deportation protection and work permits) for the time being

- DACA recipients can continue submitting renewal applications
- Pending renewal applications will be processed by U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services
- People should continue to submit their DACA renewal applications 120 150 days before the expiration date
- USCIS has been experiencing delays processing DACA applications

Advance Parole


• Current DACA recipients can **continue** applying for permission to travel outside of the United States through Advance Parole for humanitarian, educational, and employment purposes.
